Course Description

This course studies theatre history through examination of dramatic literature in the context of performance tradition. Ranging from religious ritual of antiquity to contemporary theatre, students examine historic live performance through the textual analysis of plays, playwriting genres, production methods, historic acting styles, and overall theatre history. Students will carefully read multiple plays and via discussion and in-class scene performances, provide both scholarly analysis and performative perspectives. A key understanding is that theatre is a commentary of the social, political, economic, and cultural aspects of the time it was written.
