Course Description

This course, using the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) for Fine Arts framework, provides ideas for using drama games and activities as a pedagogical component for teaching any subject in grades K-5. Using drama in the classroom can maximize learning, deliver key content in an easily understood format, and help embrace increasingly diverse classrooms through inclusive teaching practices. Participatory drama exercises ensure a supportive learning environment for all students, one in which they can learn and explore new ideas both individually and as members of groups.

The use of drama and theatrical activities in the classroom is a proven way to engage students in any subject. A movement in education that began in the 1960s, there are many reasons for engaging children with theatre in the classroom – from 1961: entertainment, psychological growth, educational exposure, aesthetic appreciation, and development of future theatre audiences; to today: inspirational, challenges perceptions/attitudes/behaviors, improves self-esteem/motivation/achievement, delivers key messages easily understood, and maximizes learning.

Learning Outcomes

- 1. Learn and understand elements of drama and conventions of theatre
- 2. Explore theory and practice of using drama activities in the classroom
- 3. Understand and evaluate the pedagogical value of drama activities for the student
- 4. Incorporate drama activities into an elementary classroom lesson plan using the TEKS Fine Arts K-5 framework for Theatre §117.101, .104, .107, .110, .113, .116, .119

Journal Entries (25%)

A running commentary on the course material in which you'll pose questions, doubts, connections, and articulating opposing viewpoints for each class meeting. Additional journal topics will be posted to Canvas and mentioned in class. Each entry should be a minimum of 250 words (equivalent of one typed page) and is due the following class.

Final Exam (25%)

Presentation of your final lesson, ideally before a group of elementary school students.
